It is Amazing that the MTBA is a piece of a puzzle that completes the picture of a State-wide Baptist Mission project that is coordinated for youth and adult mentors and leaders as a summer activity. Our piece of the puzzle could be broken down into smaller pieces that come together before being fitted into the larger picture. The MTBA had a working Community Ministries Action Group Committee that organized the lodging, materials/supplies, and feeding of the youth and adults who choose to come to our area rather than other areas of the state, to perform manual labor as a mission project repairing homes. I was uplifted by Betty Kennon's enthusiasm and for Eddie's idea of Church Hubs preparing the daily lunches. I enjoyed working with Betty, as well as the other committee members and volunteers I met during the event.
